#### STAND DOWN 2016



Seminole County Veterans Services Program held its annual Homeless Veteran Stand Down on March 12, 2016, at the Florida Department of Health in Seminole County. Mike Ertel, Seminole County Supervisor of Elections lent his voice by emceeding

the opening ceremony. Other community leaders were on hand to provide comments; Seminole County Commissioner Bob Dallari, Seminole County Chief Judge John Gulluzzo; Seminole County Veterans Court Judge John Woodard III; Supervising Public Defender Jeff Dowdy, City of Sanford's Andrew Thomas, Florida Health Department's Donna Walsh; Director of the Orlando VA Medical Center, Tim Liezert, Pastor Stu Walters and Sean Gibbs.

This event would not be possible without donations provided by VITAS Hospice Services, The Fleet Reserve of Seminole County, DAV Chapter 30 and DAV Auxiliary Unit # 30.

Veterans were able to take advantage of an array of services. Free haircuts, warm showers and toiletries were provided to the Veterans. Candlelight Catering, one of the annual supporters, provided a balance meal to the sixty-two Veterans that participated. Several of the Veterans were chronically homeless and took advantage of the supportive services available.



These supportive services connected the Veterans to VA Benefits, ACCESS Florida/Snaps, Dental care, and a host of other meaningful services. This was no small feat for an event of this magnitude. Partnership and collaboration made this event possible. Ed Burford, Veteran Service Officer, and his team coordinated with several key partners, including the Orlando VA, City of Sanford, Florida Health Department in Seminole County and the Winter Springs

High School-JROTC.

More than seventy-two volunteers and twenty four agencies and organizations gave back to those who have made personal sacrifices for our country.



### Community Assistance

On March 27, 2016, the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) was published in the Orlando Sentinel advising applications for the Community Services Agency (CSA) program FY16/17 funding cycle would be available beginning Monday, March 28, 2016. Deadline for application submission is Thursday, April 21, 2016 by 4:00 pm.

The mission of the Community Services Agency (CSA) Partnership Grant program is to further Seminole County's mission "to deliver excellent public service that enhances the quality of life and addresses our community's needs, now and in the future." Seminole County has an extensive history of partnership with local non-profit agencies to benefit and improve the quality of life for residents

The majority of available funding will be allocated for Essential Life Services, which is defined as services that meet the basic needs for daily survival that sustain the quality of life for residents. The remaining funds are available for Supportive Services, which has been defined as services that enhance the quality of life for residents.

### Prosecution Alternatives for Youth (P.A.Y.)

#### D.U. HIGH

D. U. High was developed as a P.A.Y. Program competency sanction to educate juveniles between the ages of 14 & 17 on the negative effects marijuana use has on their physical development, daily functions, as well as the dangerous impairments and consequences of driving while under the influence. D.U. High utilizes the Fatal Vision Marijuana Simulation System as its core curriculum. A special thank you to the Seminole Prevention Coalition and Executive Director, Debbie Owens, for their generosity in the purchasing and donation of the Fatal Vision Marijuana Simulation System. The D.U. High pilot course was launched on January 20<sup>th</sup>, 2016 with excellent feedback from the inaugural class. D.U. High is held on the third Thursday of every month and class size is limited to eight juveniles. The P.A.Y. Program is looking forward to continued success of the D.U. High course as it progresses into 2016.



#### ADOPT A ROAD

The Seminole County PAY Program is responsible for cleaning up two county roadways (Ronald Reagan Blvd. in Longwood and Fernwood Blvd. in Casselberry) through their Adopt A Road Program. On 2/20/2016, youth and staff collected over four bags of debris and picked up several needles on the roadways. Thank you P.A.Y. youths for doing such an amazing job.

#### APRIL IS FAIR HOUSING MONTH!!

On April 11, 1968, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1968, which was meant as a follow-up to the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The 1968 act expanded on previous acts and prohibited discrimination concerning the sale, rental, and financing of housing based on race, religion, national origin, sex, (and as amended) handicap and family status. Title VIII of the Act is also known as the Fair Housing Act (of 1968). Community Services is continuing the tradition of Fair Housing Month by holding the 2016 Seminole County Fair Housing Summit at the BCC Chambers on April 27th. The summit will provide an opportunity for citizens, builders, realtors, local governments and all other housing stakeholders to learn about fair housing, including the recently overhauled rule on Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing. This rule clarifies and simplifies existing fair housing obligations and priorities to address the fair housing barriers.




### BLACK HISTORY MONTH CELEBRATION
