




Protective Service Area


PARAMEDIC AND EMT COMPLIANCE/
CONTINUING EDUCATION TRAINING

The Medical Director's Office establishes the emergency medicine protocols that Paramedics and EMTs can perform and practice under the Medical Director's license.

- SCFD staff attend monthly Medical Director meetings to discuss recent EMS calls and review quality assurance, dialogue, and training.
- In 2022, SCFD awarded 37 Life Saving Awards to personnel, and local hospitals also honored several crews for their live-saving contributions.



SCFD's 2022 Paramedic of the Year Matt Humphrey received a Life Saving Award from Deputy Chief Ben DeCuir. He was honored with the crew at Station 24 C Shift.



SCFD FACT: SCFD is one of the few County Fire Departments in the nation to attain ISO Class 1 rating and accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation of Ambulance Services (CAAS).

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COMMUNITY PARAMEDICINE





In 2022, the Seminole County Fire Department began delivering proactive healthcare to County residents through the Community Paramedicine Program. This free program, targeted to specific patient populations, utilizes paramedics to provide guidance and care, while at the same time helping residents become more independent from the emergency system.

New technology is an integral part of SCFD's goal to remain innovative while protecting people and property in Seminole County. From Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and Geographic Information Systems (GIS) that help improve mapping data needed for fast responses, to Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) or drones that can survey incidents and damages, SCFD aims to utilize the newest technology to better serve the public in their time of greatest need.

Internal Trails Response App:

Seminole County has hundreds of miles of both paved and wilderness trails. In 2022, SCFD began utilizing an internal trails response app to find lost or injured hikers and bikers on the trail. This technology has significantly cut search and rescue times on trails from an average of 2-3 hours to 25-35 minutes.

UAS/Drones:

SCFD has 18 personnel certified to fly UAS/drone equipment. This enables the Department to:

- Provide enhanced situational awareness to on-site incident commanders through real-time, bird's-eye views
- Capture "hot spots" where fire may be present
- Enhance wide-area search capabilities



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SPECIAL OPERATIONS

Emergencies including high-angle emergencies, water rescues, HazMat, heavy technical response, extrication, and so much more are what SCFD's Special Hazards & Operations Team (SHOT) is all about.

Thanks to their dedication, SCFD is known as one of the premier all-hazards fire departments in the state and throughout the nation. Starting as a small team in 1992, SHOT recently celebrated its 30th anniversary. Today, there are 56 SHOT team members with a combined thousands of extra hours of training and specialty coursework.

Urban Search & Rescue Task Force 4

Urban Search & Rescue Central Florida Task Force 4 deployed to Lee County in late September 2022 to assist with Hurricane Ian response and recovery. Throughout the two-week deployment, Task Force 4 searched 2,500 structures and over 200 vessels. They also rescued several families and assisted survivors with post-storm recovery efforts. Fourteen SCFD US&R members deployed along with other members of local fire departments.

Additional Deployments:

- Four members of SCFD's Burn Team joined an interagency team with the state of Florida through U.S. Forestry and deployed to Angelus Oaks, California in September 2022 to fight wildfires.
- In March 2022, SCFD personnel deployed with an Engine Strike Team to protect people and property from wildfires in Bay County as part of the Florida Statewide Emergency Plan (SERP) response.

SAVE A LIFE SEMINOLE HANDS-ONLY CPR: TRAINED 1,149 RESIDENTS



SCFD partnered with Seminole County Public Schools to teach hands-only CPR to high school students through the Save-A-Life Seminole program. This year, SCFD increased CPR training participation by 82%.



In 2022, **nine** Child Passenger Safety Technicians were trained. Technicians installed and/or checked **75** car seats. Previously, SCFD relied on only two technicians to perform these checks.

NEW UNITS:



Quint 24 was put in service in March 2022. The multifunctioning fire truck is the second of its kind for Seminole County, serving as a cross between a fire engine and ladder truck. It has five primary functions, hence the name "quint." Functions include a pump, water tank, large diameter firehose, an aerial device and ground ladders.

Historically, when a new unit is placed into service, it is sprayed "wet-down" by a fire hose, then pushed into the station bay to commemorate that it is ready to serve the community.



Tower 39 went into service in July 2022. This aerial is currently at Station 13 in Apopka until Station 39 opens in the Heathrow/Sanford area.


