Wilderness Areas Are Open for Free From Sunrise to Sunset

BLACK BEAR WILDERNESS AREA

Shallow marsh, hydric hammock and cypress swamps form a mosaic of habitat diversity which host wildlife such as the white-tailed deer, swallow-tailed kite and Florida black bear. Its large size and proximity to other public lands make this site an important piece in a puzzle connecting natural areas between the Wekiva/St. Johns basins and the Ocala National Forest.

1600 acres | 7 mile loop trail | 3-4 hour hike 👘 🛆 🔥

BLACK HAMMOCK WILDERNESS AREA

This land was acquired in partnership with the St. Johns **River Water Management District to preserve significant** habitat along the shores of Lake Jesup. Hike along boardwalks through hydric hammocks, mixed-hardwood swamp, pine flatwoods and sand pine scrub. Wildlife here includes barred owls, white-tailed deer, bobcats and eastern coral snakes.

700+ acres | 4.5 mile loop (blue) | 2 hour hike

The Ed Yarborough Nature Center, open by appointment only, features exhibits and hosts school programs, parties, meetings and camps.

CHULUOTA WILDERNESS AREA

This site has extensive and diverse natural communities such as pond pine flatwoods, sand pine scrub, and bayhead swamp. Its remote location and variety of habitats make it an excellent destination for bird watching, wildlife study and nature photography. See white-tailed deer, gopher tortoise, coyote, and the eastern diamondback rattlesnake.

625 acres | 2 loop trails: 2.6 miles (red) & 2.7 miles (yellow) |2-3 hour hike



ECON RIVER WILDERNESS AREA

The Econlockhatchee River, like the St. John's River, is one of very few rivers in North America that flows north. This scenic walking trail will take you through habitats such as pine flatwoods, sand hill and river swamp. Wildlife observed on this site includes the great horned owl, white-tailed deer and red-headed woodpecker.





GENEVA WILDERNESS AREA

This site, which is home to the Ed Yarborough Nature Center, features a beautiful mosaic of flatwoods, ponds, sand pine scrub and bayhead swamp, all supporting an equally diverse collection of wildlife. A hike here can reward visitors with sightings of gopher tortoise, whitetailed deer, wild turkey and gray fox.

LAKE HARNEY WILDERNESS AREA

A viewing tower at this site overlooks the floodplain of Lake Harney, an important feeding ground for wading birds as well as a filter for water quality in Seminole County. Visitors can spot several bald eagles' nests amongst the oak hammocks and mixed hardwood swamps.

300 acres | 2 loop trails, 1.4 miles (yellow) & 0.9 miles (orange) | 1 hour hike **Access the Flagler Trail**



LAKE JESUP WILDERNESS AREA

Purchased in cooperation with the St. Johns River Water Management District, visitors can explore miles of trails or boardwalks to view the extensive floodplain of Lake Jesup. Trails are seasonally flooded. Animals who call this property home include the anhinga, bald eagle, and American alligator.



LAKE PROCTOR WILDERNESS AREA

A hike through this Geneva property will take you through habitats such as sand pine scrub, pine flatwoods, sand hill and bayhead swamp. You could be rewarded with sightings of wood ducks, white-tailed deer, red foxes, and Florida worm lizards. The red trail provides an opportunity for viewing habitat restoration in progress, including areas recently burned with prescribed fire.
